The Secret Is Out: Boldly Declaring the Gospel Message of Jesus Christ By Bishop Charlene M. Jamison

Secrets have a magnetic quality—they intrigue, compel, and beckon us to uncover the truth hidden within. In the Bible, one divine secret stands above all—a mystery once hidden, now revealed in the gospel message of Jesus Christ. Today, we boldly declare this transformative truth, proclaiming it to a world desperate for salvation and hope. The secret is out, and its revelation is both a call to action and a message of eternal joy.

What Is a Secret?

A secret, by definition, is knowledge that is hidden or known by only a few. Scripture often describes the gospel as a "mystery" that was once concealed but is now unveiled through Christ. As Paul writes in Colossians 1:26-27: "The mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations, but is now disclosed to the Lord's people. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God." This sacred calling requires courage, love, and unwavering commitment to the truth.

Moreover, Jesus reminds us of the cost of discipleship in Matthew 16:24-25: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it." Declaring the gospel boldly may invite challenges, but it also brings the unparalleled joy of fulfilling God's purpose.

The Impact of the Revelation

Unashamed and steadfast, Paul proclaimed the message of Christ to Jews and Gentiles alike, despite imprisonment and suffering.

We, too, are called to embrace this fearless proclamation. In 2 Timothy 1:7-8, Paul encourages Timothy, "For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love, and self-discipline. So do not be ashamed of the testimony about our Lord." The gospel is not meant to be hidden—it is a light that shines brightly, illuminating the darkness and bringing hope to all who encounter it.

Isaiah 61:1 captures this mission: "The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me, because the Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners." As bearers of this divine secret, we are entrusted with the sacred responsibility of guiding others toward freedom and restoration.
